Council's 2018/19 Budget is also a great win for the environment, with funding for clean energy projects and initiatives that will create a more sustainable future for us all.


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OUR NEW 10 YEAR PLAN

ROADS ARE A MAJOR FOCUS IN 2018/19

- Road resealing 20.4 kilometres of roads are scheduled to be resealed.
- Pothole patching Council will continue its heavy pothole patching program this year and the pothole truck will provide more responsive pothole patching across the Byron Shire.
- Gravel re-sheet program for the first time we're investing \$200,000 in a gravel re-sheet program.

With more than two million visitors a year enjoying the natural beauty and hospitality of the Byron Shire and utilising our ageing infrastructure, Council will continue to actively lobby the Federal and State Government for further funding and ways to raise additional revenue.

Free or low-cost community services and events

Tap into a range of free services at Byron Shire's three libraries or take advantage of council-run child care, vacation care and after school care services around the shire. Achieving zero emissions

A range of benefits will flow from clean energy initiatives over the next 12 months including expansion of solar farms at the Bangalow, Byron and Brunswick Valley sewage treatment plants. Council will also begin transforming our Shire's sewage and waste into 'bioenergy' using state of the art technology. This will result in lower bills and greater self-sufficiency for the Shire. It's another big win as Council moves towards its goal to achieve zero emissions by 2025.


Planning for greater liveability

UNDERSTANDING YOUR RATES AND CHARGES

The revenue Council receives from your rates and charges includes ordinary rate revenue which is used to provide general services such as roads, sporting grounds, parks and gardens, libraries and other community facilities and services. The revenue generated from water charges, sewer charges, stormwater charges and waste charges is used to fund those services specifically.

Your rate notice will list the rates and charges applicable to your property. Further information about out how we will levy rates and charges in 2018/19 is outlined in our Statement of Revenue Policy in our 2017/21 Delivery Program and 2018/19 Operational Plan on our website.







Save paper and the environment by choosing to receive your quarterly rates and water notices electronically. See your Rates or Water Notices for details required for registration.

FREE BULKY AND GARDEN WASTE DROP-OFF

Each property is entitled to one single free drop-off each financial year of up to 150kg bulky waste items (e.g. furniture, carpet, appliances, mattresses) or up to 500kg garden waste.

STOP WATER LEAKS

Leaking pipes, taps and toilets not only waste water but cost hundreds and sometimes thousands of dollars. Water leaks are not always visible, and owners or tenants are responsible for water consumed, so it is wise to regularly check for leaks. See your water notice for handy hints to stop leaks.

UPDATE ON THE SPECIAL RATE VARIATION (SRV)

In June 2017, the Independent Pricing and Regulatory Tribunal (IPART) approved a 'special rate variation' for Council to increase the total revenue generated by rates by 7.5 per cent per annum for four years.

We are now in the second year of this approval with the additional revenue of \$2.276 million (18/19) committed to asset renewal and maintenance.
