

Mayor's Message



For Councillors and staff, the community is at the core of what we do and in the last 12 months we have never worked harder as we continue our flood recovery journey.

We have a damage bill estimated at over \$300 million and at 30 June had submitted funding applications for all of this work. Only a handful of these applications have been approved so far which has allowed us

to get a start on the reconstruction of Federal Drive, drainage at Upper Huonbrook and the replacement of Englishes Bridge.

For people negotiating the damaged roads and causeways every day, progress has been frustratingly slow. I am hoping that this will change as the NSW Government approves more of our applications. At our end we will be getting the work done as soon as we are able and as quickly as we can.

I am so proud that our hard work to try to deliver more housing to the long-term rental pool in our Shire was vindicated by findings from an Inquiry held by the NSW Independent Planning Commission and we will continue to negotiate with the State Government on this. You can find out more about this on page six.

Reflecting on the last 12 months there have been some major achievements. We opened the new \$2.6 million Byron Bay Skate Park, progressed several affordable housing initiatives, delivered major improvements on roads including Midgen Flat Road and The Pocket Road, resealed roads in Mullumbimby, Ocean Shores and Ewingsdale, built a new shared path at Bangalow, adopted a Dogs in Public Spaces Strategy, completed a project to help rebuild the sand dunes at Byron Bay's Main Beach, supported our rough sleepers and so much more.

Looking ahead the 2023/24 budget is lean, a reflection of the floods and the additional, and unforeseen costs the organisation is carrying.

We are balancing the costs of flood recovery work and our regular maintenance and upgrade programs, all the while mindful of the services our community wants and needs.

Thank you for your patience as we continue the recovery journey.

Your rates notice in 2023/24

The NSW Valuer General updates property land values every three years so all NSW councils can determine the rates landowners will pay.

The most recent valuations for the Byron Shire were undertaken in 2022.

Important things to know are:

- · Council does not receive more money because the value of land in the Shire has increased. The amount of money we are able to raise via general rates in 2023/24 is capped by the NSW Government at 4.6%.
- Your rates do not increase or decrease by the same percentage as your land value increases or decreases. Generally, if your land value increased by more than 95% you may pay more rates in 2023/24 and if it increased by less than 95% you may pay less.
- Your rates are calculated by multiplying the value of your land by a 'rate in the dollar' which is set by the Council every year.
- The 'rate in the dollar', also known as the Ad Valorem, in 2023/24 is

0.1080 for residential properties. There are different rates for business and farm land. This information is on our website. https://www.byron.nsw.gov.au/

- To ensure all property owners are contributing to Council services there is also a minimum rate which is applied to all land under a certain value.
- In 2023/24, the minimum rate of \$1,000 applies to all residential land that is valued at \$925,926 or less.

The following examples show how much land rates a residential property owner will pay in 2023/24 for a range of land values.

- 2022 land value \$750,000 \$750,000 x 0.001080 = \$810.00 This is less than the minimum amount payable so the property will pay \$1,000.00
- 2022 land value \$1,000,000 \$1,000,000 x 0.001080 = \$1,080.00
- 2022 land value \$2,500,000 \$2,500,000 x 0.001080 = \$2,700.00

Check out the new Jarjumirr **Byron Bay Skate Park**

It's open and fully sick!

The long-awaited Byron Bay Skate Park opened on 1 June and from reports from skaters it's pretty awesome.

Designed and built by Convic, one of the world's best skate park designers, there is something for everyone with a competition-level bowl, and plenty of room to skate, kick-flip and grind.

Jarjumirr Park was funded by a \$2.05 million grant from the NSW Government and Council contributed \$600,000.

"It's important for our community to recognise the critical role the Bundjalung of Byron Bay Arakwal people and Tweed Byron Local Aboriginal Land Council played in enabling this project to be delivered for Byron Shire on this land," Byron Shire Mayor Michael Lyon, said.



Old Byron Bay Hospital redevelopment

There will be major changes on the old Byron Bay Hospital site in 2023/24 with work to get underway on transforming it into a community precinct with a focus on education, community support services and an outlet for socially-minded commercial enterprises.

Planning consent has been granted and construction is due to start in August/ September 2023.

All going well the redevelopment will be finished by mid-2024.

Not-for-profit organisation, Social Futures, will manage the site when the redevelopment is finished.

Flood Recovery

Roads, bridges, causeways...

More than 600 pieces of infrastructure including roads, bridges and causeways were damaged in the 2022 flood and the repair bill is estimated to be around \$300 million.

We have submitted funding applications for the repair and reconstruction of this infrastructure and so far have received approval for:

- Federal Drive reconstruction (\$23 million)
- Huonbrook drainage (\$1.5 million)
- Englishes Bridge (\$1.9 million completed)

We have submitted funding applications for roads, bridges and causeways in the following areas:

- Gravel resheeting for Kennedys Lane, Cedarvale Road, Durrumbul Road, Riverside Drive, The Saddle Road, Jones Road and Huonbrook Road
- Upper Wilsons Creek roads
- Huonbrook Road landslip
- Coopers Lane and Coopers Creek Road
- Beatties Creek Road and Johnsons Road causeways
- Bridge and guardrail replacements for Booyong,
 Donaghys, Jubillee Avenue, Keys, Palmwoods, Pioneer,
 Repentance Creek and O'Mearas bridges

- The Pocket Road
- Main Arm causeways 8, 11, 13, 14, 15 and the culvert between 15 and Dry Creek Road
- Mullumbimby drainage structures
- Palmwoods Road causeways 1, 2 and 3
- · Wilsons Creek Road
- Left Bank Road
- Landslips at various locations including Johnsons Road, Huonbrook Road, Goonengerry Road and Possum Shoot Road
- Wanganui Road causeways 1, 2 and 3.

What happens next?

Council can only do periodic maintenance on roads until we get funding approval from Transport for NSW for permanent repairs or replacement.

Once approved we will work as fast as we can to get the work done but some of the projects are complex and will need to go to tender.

The timeframe for flood repairs and reconstruction is likely to stretch beyond 2026.



Mullum Flood Recovery Centre wins NSW Award

The Mullum Flood Recovery Centre has won the Community Partnerships Award at the 2023 Local Government Excellence Awards.

It's an award that recognises the amazing work of everyone involved in the Recovery Centre, including Council staff, and the Mullumbimby and District Neighbourhood Centre whose staff and volunteers make an incredible difference to our community every day.

From March to August last year support was provided at the Recovery Centre to people and businesses on more than 8,000 occasions, in an environment that was safe, nurturing and reflective of our special community.

Success for Byron Bay dune recovery project

In November last year heavy equipment moved onto Byron Bay's Clarkes Beach and Main Beach for a week, marking the start of a dune recovery project.

They scraped sand from the tidal zone further up the beach onto the eroded dune system in a process that mimics Mother Nature but is much faster.

Fast forward six months and the dunes are recovering nicely, native vegetation is growing, and wildlife has moved back in.

The project was recognised at the Local Government Excellence Awards where it won the Environmental Leadership category.

Chloe Dowsett, our Coast and Biodiversity Coordinator said the award was a terrific endorsement of the success of the project.



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Sustainable Environment and Economy

Short term holiday letting – what's next?

Following on from the release of the NSW Independent Planning Commission's (IPC) report on its Inquiry into Short Term Holiday Accommodation (STRA) in the Byron Shire, Council is preparing a case for the NSW Government.

The IPC released its report in April, recommending a 60-day cap on STRA in all parts of the Byron Shire in what was a stronger, more balanced position than Council's proposal for a 90-day cap in some sections of the shire.

Byron Shire Mayor, Michael Lyon, said the IPC's report was a strong endorsement of the work Council is trying to do to address a lack of long-term housing in the area.

"The question we are getting asked now is 'what's next?'," Mayor Lyon said.

"We have just submitted a response to the NSW Government demonstrating how we can implement the recommendations in the IPC report effectively.

"We have been working on this planning proposal for several years now and in all of our negotiations with the NSW Government we have presented a considered position that is supported by credible and strong evidence.

"This is no different and we have legal and planning experts working on a proposal that will clearly show the NSW Government how we will go about regulating STRA in our Shire," Mayor Lyon said.

The current timeframe will see the planning proposal completed by September this year with the hope it will be in force from June 2024," he said.

Saving Byron Shire – one piece of rubbish at a time

2022/23 - what a year!

- Our Butt Free Byron Shire (Phase 2) campaign won a Keep Australia Beautiful - Tidy Towns Award.
- Illegal dumping decreased by almost 20%.
- Staff and volunteers picked up 1,200kgs of rubbish on Clean Up Australia Day.
- We opened the Re-Market (aka the revamped tip shop) at the Byron Resource Recovery Centre to create a new space for workshops to encourage repair and reusing.
- Via the tip shop we saved 123 tonnes of waste from going to landfill, more than double that of the year before.
- We launched the Bring it Back – Bruns reuse system. The pilot runs until September 2023.
- We diverted 54 tonnes of E-waste, 1,066 tonnes of scrap metal and 310 tonnes of concrete from landfill.
- Transformed 3,090 tonnes of garden waste into 2,520 tonnes of garden compost.
